Understanding

This Gift of the Holy Spirit helps us to know ourselves better as we grow in our relationship with God. Saint Augustine said of this gift, "That I may know You, may I know myself." Ruth in the Old Testament understood the needs of others, and her actions showed it (read Ruth 1:11–18).

THEICHURCHTEOLLOWSTJESUS The Gleaning Network

The work of the Gleaning Network tells us much about their focus on justice. This group of dedicated people value and live Christ's command to love one another.

The Gleaning Network is an organization that responds to the needs of many people who are without food. Its thousands of volunteers provide millions of servings of nourishing food to feed the hungry in the United States each year. These people call themselves, "gleaners." Do you remember Ruth in the Old Testament who stood by her mother-in-law, Naomi? The Gleaners chose their name to honor Ruth, who gleaned from the fields crops not harvested to support her and her family.

The Gleaners in the Midwest saw that their fertile region produced an abundance of crops, such as tomatoes, oranges, onions, and carrots. Some of this food went to waste. The Gleaners contacted local farmers to help them collect the unused crops.

The Gleaners grew larger and larger, involved members of other churches, and they purchased their own buildings. They now bring in fresh produce and canned goods from grocery stores and from food drives. They distribute food not just to people in their own communities but to the needy throughout the country in which they live. Gleaners in your community are living the call to holiness and justice. They take up the challenge to feed the poor and live the Works of Mercy.

Called to Be Saints

Our life's job description is to share in God's **holiness**. God created us to be holy as he is holy. He created us to know him, to love him, to serve him, and to live with him forever in eternal happiness. God's command to the Israelites is a command to all his people:

"For I, the Lord, am your God; and you shall make and keep yourselves holy, because I am holy. . . . Since I, the Lord, brought you up from the land of Egypt that I might be your God, you shall be holy, because I am holy." Levincus 11:44-45

The ability and freedom to live a holy life is a gift from God. He not only invites us to live a life in communion with him but also gives us the powers to live that life. God gives us the **Theological Virtues**, which help us to live as his children.

Faith, Hope, and Charity

The Theological Virtues enable us to grow stronger in holiness, the life of God within us. They are those strengths that begin in God and direct us toward holiness. There are three Theological Virtues: faith, hope, and charity. You may recall that Saint Paul concludes his great hymn to love with this memorable verse,

So faith, hope, love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love.

1 Corinthians 13:13

These virtues are gifts from God. The more we choose to live according to these virtues, the more we grow in holiness.


Theological Virtues

The virtues of faith, hope, and charity; gifts of God that enable us to live a life of holiness, or a life in communion with the Holy Trinity

Works of Mercy

Virtuous actions that we do to help others in need, grouped as Corporal (bodily needs) and Spiritual (spiritual needs)





Grace and Freedom

With Christ, everything changed. Before Christ's life, Passion, Death, Resurrection, and glorious Ascension, humanity was under the power of sin and death. By dying, he destroyed our death and freed us from sin's power. By rising from the dead, he restored our life of holiness. We join with the Church and proclaim this faith at Mass when we sing or pray aloud:

Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free.

MEMORIAL ACCLAMATION, ROMAN MISSAL

At Baptism, we are joined to Christ and are made sharers in his work of Salvation and Redemption. We receive the grace of holiness called sanctifying grace. We are made right with God the Father in Christ. We receive the gift of the Holy Spirit to live holy lives. God freely gives us the gift of Salvation in Christ. Salvation is not something we could ever earn on our own.

It is due to him that you are in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, as well as righteousness, sanctification, and redemption.

1 CORINTHIANS 1:30

With the sanctifying grace of the Holy Spirit, we are made holy again. The grace of the Holy Spirit calls us to use responsibly

the gift of freedom and to grow in holiness (read Proverbs 12:13). With the grace of the Holy Spirit, we grow in our ability to make the right choices and to live as adopted children of God the Father. We turn toward God and away from sin. We accept forgiveness and the gift of having our communion

How does grace help us to be free?



Growth in Holiness

God's gift of holiness is not just for us as individuals. It is not something we keep for ourselves. As God shares his life and love with us, we also share our life and love with others. Our growth in holiness involves the way that we live with other people. Holiness is about how we act with others.

Saint Paul teaches,

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another. . . . And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection.

COLOSSIANS 3:12-14

The Church gives us the Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy to guide us in living the life of mercy and compassion that Saint Paul describes. These **Works of Mercy** are part of the Church's social teachings—a collection of principles that guide us to moral living as a holy community. Yet the Works of Mercy are not just an idea; they are concrete, practical things that we can do to live the Gospel. They clearly show that holiness is not just an idea but something we must practice everyday. Holiness is a life of true courage, a life that requires God's grace.

Catholics Believe

Sacramentals

Sacramentals are sacred signs that help us give praise to God and live holy lives. The Church uses sacramentals to remind us of God's presence with us. One of the most important sacramentals is blessings. Blessings include praising God for his works and gifts and the Church's intercessions for people to use God's gifts according to the Gospel.
