Triduum/Holy Thursday

Do you remember eating a special meal with your family or your friends? What made it special to you? Did you eat special food? Did someone say something that made you feel good about yourself? The Church remembers a special meal that Jesus ate with his disciples.

On the evening of Holy Thursday, we remember the last time Jesus gathered the disciples and shared a meal with them. This meal celebrated the Passover. On this special day, the Jewish people celebrate their passage from slavery in Egypt to freedom. They remember the Covenant with God.

All his life, Jesus celebrated this greatest of Jewish feasts with his family and friends. Now he shared the foods of the Passover for the last time. But at this Last Supper, Jesus did something special. Jesus changed the bread and wine he shared with his disciples into his own Body and Blood. He took the bread and broke it and said,

"This is my body, which will be given for you, do this in memory of me."

After they had eaten, he passed the cup of wine for them to drink. He said,

"This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which will be shed for you."


Later that night, one of the disciples betrayed Jesus, and he was arrested.




The Lord's Supper

Tonight, at the celebration of the Eucharist, the Church continues to do what Jesus asked his disciples to do. On Holy Thursday evening, we especially remember his last Passover with his disciples. We call our celebration on that day the Mass of the Lord's Supper.

Triduum/Good Friday

At some time in your life, someone you love will die. This may have already happened to you. You know that when this happens, everyone in your house is sad. People tell stories about the one who has died. The Church does this too as it remembers the Death of Jesus.

On Good Friday, our churches have no decorations. The tabernacle is empty; its door is open. There is no altar cloth covering the altar table. The Church gathers to reflect on the Passion and Death of Jesus.


Our liturgy on Good Friday is called the Celebration of the Lord's Passion. Good Friday is the only day of the year on which Mass is not celebrated. The Celebration of the Lord's Passion is made up of three parts:

• The first part is the Liturgy of the Word. The Gospel reading is a proclamation of the Passion and Death of Jesus according to John. After the Gospel proclamation, the Church invites us to pray for the needs of the world (Solemn Intercessions).

• The second part of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion is the Adoration of the Holy Cross. In this part of the liturgy, we show reverence and respect for the cross because Jesus died for us on a cross. We might do this by walking in procession, bowing before the cross, and kissing it.

 The third part of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion is Holy Communion. The Church invites us to receive the Body and Blood of Christ, which is consecrated at Mass on Holy Thursday and reserved in a tabernacle as a place of repose, meaning pause or rest.


The Celebration of the Lord's Passion ends as it began. The altar cloth is removed from the altar, and the tabernacle is empty. In deep silence, we leave to begin the long sabbath rest until the celebration of the Easter Vigil.




Jesus Asks, You Respond

Triduum/Easter

On our best days, we feel great joy just to be alive. We can do many wonderful things. Easter is a wonderful day in the Church—a day when we rejoice because God has raised Jesus to new life.

Saint Augustine reminds us that we are Easter people and Alleluia is our song. Alleluia is a Hebrew word that means "Praise the Lord." At the Easter Vigil, the presider solemnly intones the Alleluia, which we have not heard all during Lent. The Church sings "Alleluia!" repeatedly during the Easter season. We continuously thank and praise God for the new life of Easter. We praise God because we have passed from death to life through our Baptism.

Throughout Lent, we focused on turning away from sin to become followers of Jesus. During the Easter season, we rejoice in our new life in Christ. We sing "Alleluia!" and may proclaim,

"This is the day the LORD has made; let us rejoice in it and be glad"



The Ascension of the Lord


For forty days after the Resurrection, the Risen Jesus appeared to his disciples and continued to teach them about the Kingdom of God. At their last meeting, he gathered them together on a hill near Jerusalem and reminded them that they must wait for the promise of the Father, the Holy Spirit.

Jesus knew he would soon be home in Heaven with his Father. The power of the Holy Spirit would fill the disciples with wisdom and courage to continue the mission of Jesus on Earth.

Jesus said to the disciples, "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me, go, therefore and make disciples of all nations. . . ." (Matthew 28:18). Then, as the disciples looked on, Jesus was taken up into Heaven.

The Ascension of the Lord completes Jesus' Paschal Mystery, the passing over of Jesus from life on Earth through his Passion, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension into a new and glorified life with God, the Father, in Heaven.


The Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord forty days after Easter (or on the Seventh Sunday of Easter). This holy day of obligation expresses our belief that Jesus has returned to his Father in glory and majesty to reign with him in Heaven. We believe Jesus has prepared a place for those who love him. We believe that, like the disciples, we must continue the mission of Jesus on Earth.




Continuing Christ's Mission

The disciples knew a day like that. They received a great gift that made them strong in their belief in the Risen Lord. That day was Pentecost.

Pentecost is a Jewish harvest festival. On this holy day, the Jewish people offer the first fruits of the new harvest to God. At the time of Jesus, Jews traveled to Jerusalem for this great feast.

The disciples gathered in Jerusalem too. As they prayed together in an upper room, they heard the noise of a great wind. Flames gently settled over their heads.

They were filled with the Holy Spirit. They felt new and strong. They went out and boldly proclaimed the Risen Lord. As they spoke, all the people in the crowd heard the message in their own languages. People who could not understand one another before suddenly did! People who were separated drew together. The Holy Spirit came upon the disciples as Jesus promised. The Church was born. The work of the Church, filled with the Holy Spirit, had begun.


